



SCHOOL BOARD from page one council previously voiced frustration that the school board didn't present a 7.5 percent reduced budget like many of the other departments.

Mitch Couture, chairman of the Berlin Board of Education, explained that the board did the best it could to cut costs but wouldn't cross the threshold of what would result from a 7.5 percent decrease.

"It would be a very ugly situation," said Couture. He added that it would result in additional job loss throughout the school district.

To get the budget to the proposed level, Couture said that many positions that will be vacant at the end of the year won't be filled and some things may be cut.

Most of the increase and the budget, as a whole, are due to salary and benefits, said Couture. He added most of the \$600,000 increase in this budget is due to the contractual 3 percent cost of living raise.

Despite the overall increase, Couture said that the district will be receiving an additional \$1.2 million in state assistance this year.


"We certainly appreciate what's been done here," said Councilor Tom McCue. "We're off to a better start than in other years."

Couture gave the council a run down of its capital improvement requests. He said the projects are to buy two buses for \$160,000, paint the junior high auditorium for \$25,000, pave the high school parking lot for \$35,000 and use the remaining \$24,998 for window replacements at the junior high and Hillside School.

Couture said the schools are in the process of evaluating the efficiency of its oil boilers and will suggest possible maintenance to the heating systems based on the report.

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

cle 2) and approving the budget of the Milan Village School and payment of tuition for students in grades 7-12 to the Berlin School District (Article 3). This last included \$350,970 for Milan students at the Berlin Junior High School and \$735,910 for Milan students at the Berlin High School. Article 4 appropriated \$38,700 for the operation of the food service program (unchanged from last year). Article 5 appropriated \$120,000 for the operation of the federal entitlement grant programs.

Article 6—to appropriate \$7,000 to be added to the tuition expendable trust fund—was questioned by Fortin. Board member Sandy Pouliot explained the sum was necessary to cover unexpected costs resulting from a student moving to Milan during the school year since, particularly in this economy, people are moving in and out of the town unpredictably.

Article 7—to appropriate up to \$10,000 for the technology capital reserve fund—was also questioned. Fortin reminded the board that last year School Administrative District 20 Superintendent Paul Bousquet said he would research other ways to purchase computers. Was this appropriation necessary?

Bousquet replied that grants have dried up in this economy. School Principal Dave Backler added that the school applies for grants every year. The latest round was denied but "we are always putting in for grants."

Backler also noted, "technology is a big deal. We all deal with it every day. Computers are pretty much \$1,000 to start and our computer-on-wheels (COW) is six years old. We are trying to build up a fund so we can buy new ones if we get a good deal." The school is wired for access to the

Internet, another aspect of technology that would be supported from such a reserve. Bousquet noted, "Network devices cost a bit."

"That's important," joked Selectman George Pozzuto, "because tomorrow night (town meeting) I need the server."

After much discussion, the group agreed that although computers have become less expensive, computers for a group of elementary school youngsters get more of a beating than standard home use computers and the article was approved.

Article 8 provided for the creation of an Energy Expendable Trust Fund of \$5,000, as a reserve should oil prices spike again next year. The article was approved after it had been explained.

Article 9 provoked the most discussion. The article provided that the name of the School Roof Capital Reserve Fund be changed to the Building & Grounds Capital Reserve Fund and that \$75,000 of the unused portion of the School Roof fund (\$129,863) be appropriated for the Building and Grounds Fund. The article further provided that the school board be named as agents to expend from the new fund.

Randy Fortin moved to lower the amount provided from \$75,000 to \$25,000.

In the wide ranging discussion that followed, Pozzuto suggested the article would be more palatable if it specified what projects would be funded by the fund rather than being an open-ended "Building and Grounds" fund. In the discussion, uses mentioned for the fund included new fencing, roofing, a new well, and a new buried tank—all of which will require expenditure some time in the not too distant future.

The well particularly was an issue.

Not long ago, SAU20 Financial Administrator Pauline Plourde pointed out, the school had had to revert to bottled water because the well was producing silty water.

Glenn Gagne offered a final word in the discussion: "We have to put our trust in the school board and the administration in terms of the expenditure of the money. If the town doesn't like it, we get to fire them, so I call the question."

Fortin's amendment was defeated and in the vote on the main question that followed, 74 percent of the voters were in favor.

The voters liked the idea of Article 10, "Do you want the school board to look into increasing cooperation between the school districts of the Androscoggin Valley?"

After Ernie Minor cleared the air by asking if it would cost money and receiving the board's assurance that it would not, the group was very much in favor.

"We would have to approach the (Gorham/Randolph/Shelburne) Coop (Cooperative School Board) and we would have to ask if a study would be feasible and to become part of that," said Milan School Board member Patricia Shute. "We are coming up on the third year of five of our agreement with Berlin and we are able to look at alternatives. This seemed like a good time to look at cooperation among the school districts, at the duplication of services with the two SAUs and so on. It seemed it would be good to get an idea whether or not Milan thought it would be good to pursue this idea."

Bousquet noted that there is already cooperation among the districts, in particular that the tech person who comes to the Milan Village School once



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GM and Chrysler are living on a total of \$17.4 billion in government loans, and the task force is trying to determine if they will get more money. The companies have requested a total of \$39 billion as they try to survive the worst U.S. auto sales downturn in 27 years.

Task force members first visited the sprawling GM tech center, where they were greeted by Chief Executive Rick Wagoner and test-drove white and silver Chevrolet Volt electric cars, according to shots taken from television news helicopters.

Then it was off to the Chrysler plant in a 2009 silver Jeep Grand Cherokee Laredo driven by Bloom, where they met with top Chrysler executives, including CEO Bob Nardelli, Vice Chairman Jim Press and Tom LaSorda and Chief Financial Officer Ron Kolka.

They entered the plant near an auditorium in which the company had placed several of its future products, including electric and hybrid vehicles. The plant employs about 2,600 workers.

Both companies are working on rechargeable electric vehicles like the Volt that can go around 40 miles on a single charge from a household outlet. After 40 miles, small internal combustion engines kick in to generate electricity and power the car farther. Chrysler and GM have pledged to bring the electric vehicles to market sometime next year.

The automakers were eager to show off new products in an effort to prove they can become viable despite billions of dollars in losses. Chrysler lost \$8 billion last year, while GM lost \$30.9 billion.

Without government help, both companies would have run out of money early this year.

Bloom, Rattner and the others arrived at the Chrysler plant as the second shift went to work making the Dodge Ram pickup.

An Obama administration official, who spoke on condition of anonymity because the meetings were private, said the task force members also met with United Auto Workers President Ron Gettelfinger and other top union officials for two hours.

During the day of meetings, task force members conferred that the administration understands the sense of urgency facing the troubled auto industry, the official said.

The task force is trying to figure out how best to save the struggling GM and Chrysler as well as their parts suppliers. Ford Motor Co. has yet to take government aid, but is burning up billions in cash and lost \$14.6 billion last year.

A collapse of the auto industry could lead to as many as 3 million lost jobs at a time when the fragile economy couldn't handle it, industry analysts have said.

U.S. claims China harassed map ship

◆ Territorial claim: China claims that part of the South China Sea as its own.

WASHINGTON — Chinese ships surrounded and harassed a Navy mapping ship in international waters off China, at one point coming within 25 feet of the American boat and strewing debris in its path, the Defense Department said yesterday.

The Obama administration said it would continue naval operations in the South China Sea, most of which China considers its territory, and protested to China about what it called reckless behavior that endangered lives.

At one point during the incident Sunday the unarmed USNS Impeccable turned fire hoses on an approaching Chinese ship in self defense, the Pentagon said.

At another point a Chinese ship played chicken with the Americans, stopping dead in front of the Impeccable as it tried to sail away, forcing the civilian mariners to slam on the brakes.

"We view these as unprofessional maneuvers" and a violation of international law, Pentagon spokesman Bryan Whitman said.

The incident had overtones of spycraft, but the U.S. ship is not, strictly speaking, a spy ship. It maps the ocean floor with sonar, compiling information the Navy can use to steer its own submarines or track those of other nations.

The Impeccable was specifically designed to augment the Navy's anti-submarine capability, although military spokesmen would not be specific about the ship's duties when it was surrounded.

A Pentagon accounting of the confrontation documents the actions of the startled and

cornered American crew as a Chinese vessel closed to within 25 feet. Pictures released by the Navy give a sense of the surreal scene: The Chinese mariners had stripped to their underwear following the blast by the Impeccable's fire hoses.

Whitman called that "immature," and said the confrontation was the most aggressive of a series of incidents recently in the same area.

Impeccable's crew radioed to tell the Chinese ships that it was leaving the area and requested a safe path to navigate, the Pentagon said.

But two of the Chinese ships stopped directly ahead of the Impeccable, forcing it to an emergency stop, the U.S. account said. The Chinese also dropped pieces of wood in the water in Impeccable's path.

The incident came just a week after China and the U.S. resumed military-to-military consultations following a five-month sus-

pension over U.S. arms sales to Taiwan. And it came as China Foreign Minister Yang Jiechi was due in Washington to meet with U.S. officials.

"We're going to continue to operate in those international waters, and we expect the Chinese to observe international law around that," White House press secretary Robert Gibbs said.

A protest was lodged with the Chinese government by the U.S. Embassy in Beijing over the weekend and was repeated to a Chinese defense attache at a Pentagon meeting yesterday.

In Beijing, Chinese officials did not immediately respond to voicemail messages and e-mail regarding the U.S. allegations.

Pentagon officials said the incident followed "increasingly aggressive" acts by Chinese ships against the Impeccable on Wednesday and Saturday and against the USNS Thetis during surveillance ship on Thursday while it operated in the Yellow Sea.

In Brief

Obama seeks review of Bush's statements

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama yesterday ordered a review of George W. Bush's guidelines for implementing legislation passed by Congress, at the same time saying that he would employ his own version of how he wants the government to follow the law.

In a memo to senior government officials, Obama said they must check with Attorney General Eric Holder before relying on any of Bush's so-called "signing statements" for guidance. Bush often issued a statement when signing a bill into law, and critics said the statements at times showed government officials how to circumvent the law if Bush disagreed with it on constitutional grounds.

Obama as a candidate criticized Bush's use of signing statements, but Obama as a candidate never said he would completely eschew the centuries' old tradition.

Senators vote to keep pet projects

WASHINGTON (AP) — Members of both parties yesterday voted to keep their cherished home-state projects as the Senate resumed debate on a spend-

ing bill covering foreign aid and domestic agency budgets.

By a 63-32 vote, lawmakers rejected a bid by Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., to effectively strip about 8,000 of those earmarks from the \$410 billion measure.

"If the president really wants to change Washington, as soon as this bill reaches his desk, he should veto it and send it back and say, 'Clean it up,'" McCain said.

Instead, the White House says President Barack Obama will sign the measure, despite all the projects. During last year's campaign, Obama he promised to cut the number of earmarks way back and institute other changes.

Top officials meet on Guantanamo

WASHINGTON (AP) — Top officials of the Obama administration met privately yesterday to discuss how to close the Guantanamo Bay detention facility.

Attorney General Eric Holder hosted the first Cabinet-level meeting of President Barack Obama's Guantanamo task force. Participating in the meeting, among others, were Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, Defense Secretary Robert Gates, CIA Director Leon Panetta and FBI Director Robert Mueller.

Obama has pledged to close the facility for terror suspects within a year, and officials must decide which suspects to ship away to foreign countries and which to bring to trial in U.S. courts, or tried and held by the U.S. in some other fashion.

The group discussed standards for reviewing detainee cases, which detainee decisions will get priority, and what has been done to date.

More charges filed in Palin e-mail hacking

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — A University of Tennessee student charged with hacking into the

personal e-mail account of Sarah Palin, the Alaska governor and former Republican vice presidential nominee, pleaded not guilty yesterday to three more charges in the case.

A magistrate agreed to push back the trial of David Kernell, the son of a Democratic Tennessee legislator, from May to October.

Kernell allegedly gained access to Palin's account in September by correctly answering a series of personal security questions.

The added counts are fraud, unlawful electronic transmission of material outside Tennessee and attempts to conceal records to impede an FBI investigation.
