The projected Wind Farm for a hilltop in the town of Groton will be suffuciently distant from that town's population so that few, if any, persons will be affected by the construction.


The company erecting these mills has chosen a road in the adjoining town of Rumney as their chief means of hauling men and materiel to the site. Which means that, of all the people in either Groton or Rumney, the dozen families on Groton Hollow Road will be the only ones to suffer the ten or more months on constant traffic, noise, dust and distruption.

Why should we have to put up with this nuisance when the town of Groton receives the benefit of tax breaks and other prerequisites and we get nothing in return for our sufferance, not even a few kilowatts of power from the lines which will probably use the New Hampshire Cooperative poles currently in place on the road. There will also be an electromagnetic field in force and eventually higher overall electric rates.

The wind they use is free; the power they generate is more expensive than using natural gas or coal. Banks create money out of thin air and charge interest for its use. So what's the difference? It's thievery in either case.

If the permit were to be granted, use of Groton Hollow Road should be denied and a road in Groton used, since that town reaps all the benefits. Or, as has been suggested, let them use helicopters! Better still, move the whole project to some other distant area where we will not be affected visually, physically, or in any other way.
