



The Application

On March 26, 2010, Groton Wind, LLC, (Applicant) filed an Application for a Certificate of Site and Facility. The Applicant petitions the Site Evaluation Committee (Committee) for authority to site, construct and operate a renewable energy facility (Facility) in the Town of Groton, Grafton County. The Applicant proposes a wind energy facility consisting of 24 wind turbines, each having a nameplate capacity of 2 megawatts (MW) for a total nameplate capacity of 48 MW. On April 26, 2010, the Vice-Chairman of the Committee accepted the Application as provided in RSA 162-H:6-a, III. On May 7, 2010, the Chairman of the Committee designated a Subcommittee to review the Application as provided in RSA 162-H:4, V.

Nature and Location of the Facility and Ancillary Facilities

The Facility does not yet have a formal street address but is accessible from an access road off of Groton Hollow Road, Groton. The proposed site consists of 4,180 acres and is bounded by Route 25 to the North, Tenney Mountain Ski Resort to the East, the Forest Society's Cockerhollow Forest to the South, and Halls Brook Road to the West. The area consists of two distinct ridgeline features known as Tenney Mountain and Fletcher Mountain, which are separated by a valley known as Groton Hollow. Both ridges are oriented northeast/southwest and range in peak elevation from 1,850 to 2,300 feet.

As proposed, the Facility will utilize Gamesa G87 wind turbines. Each turbine consists of a four-section tower that will be approximately 256 feet tall; a nacelle containing a drive train, gearbox and generator measuring 28 feet in length, 10 feet in height, and 11 feet in width; and a rotor consisting of three fiberglass composite blades each measuring 139 feet in length. The overall height of each turbine is approximately 399 feet. In addition, the Applicant proposes to construct an operation and maintenance building, a 34.5kV electrical collection system, and a collection switchyard. The Applicant proposes to upgrade 2.4 mile of roads on the proposed site and to construct 9.3 miles of new roads within the site. The Applicant intends to interconnect the Facility to the Beebe River Substation owned by Public Service Company of New Hampshire (PSNH). The Applicant proposes to deliver the Facility's output through the existing distribution system, consisting of 13 miles of distribution lines within existing rights-of-way from the switchyard at the proposed site to the Beebe River Substation.

The Application also contains a series of site plans, maps, figures, photographs and drawings that detail the nature and location of various aspects of the Facility. The Application and all other correspondence and records regarding this matter are available for public inspection at the Office of the Chairman at the address set forth below and are available on line at www.nhsec.nh.gov.

Pre-Hearing Conference

On June 7, 2010 at 10 A.M., a Pre-Hearing Conference will be held at the office of the Public Utilities Commission, 21 South Fruit Street, Suite 10, Hearing Room A, Concord, New Hampshire. The purpose of the Pre-Hearing Conference is to review petitions to intervene, determine contested issues, prepare a discovery schedule and discuss proposed hearing schedules for the balance of the proceedings in this docket.

Intervention

Any person who may be interested in participating as a party in the Committee's consideration of the Application shall file a Petition to Intervene pursuant to RSA 541-A:32 and Site 202.11 on or before June 4, 2010. Petitions to Intervene should be addressed to the Chairman of the Committee at the following address:

Petitions to Intervene must set forth facts demonstrating that the petitioner's rights, duties, privileges, immunities or other substantial interests may be affected by the proceeding, or that the petitioner qualifies as an intervenor under any provision of law; and, that the interests of justice and the orderly and prompt conduct of the proceedings would not be impaired by allowing the intervention. The Chairman of the Subcommittee will rule on all motions for intervention and parties may be subject to conditions, limitations and/or consolidation with others.

Site Visit and Public Information Hearing

On June 28, 2010 at 1 P.M., weather permitting, members of the Subcommittee will conduct a site inspection visit at various places within or adjacent to the Site and location of the proposed Facility. The site visit is expected to commence at the Wal-Mart Supercenter parking lot, 683 Tenney Mountain Highway, Plymouth, N.H. and will proceed to various locations both within and outside of the proposed site.

On June 28, 2010 at 7 p.m., a Public Information Hearing will be held in room 220 of Hyde Hall, Plymouth State University. Hyde Hall is located on the corner of High Street and Langdon Street in Plymouth, New Hampshire. Pursuant to R.S.A. 162-H:6-a, IV, R.S.A. 162-H:10, I, and Site 201.01, the Subcommittee is required to hold at least one Public Information Hearing in the county in which the proposed facility is to be located. The hearing shall be for public information on the proposed facility with the Appli-

cant presenting the information to the Subcommittee and the public. The proceedings shall be recorded and members of the public will be permitted to submit questions and give public comment.

Counsel for the Public

Pursuant to RSA 162-H:9, the Attorney General shall appoint an Assistant Attorney General as Counsel for the Public. Counsel for the Public shall represent the public in seeking to protect the quality of the environment and in seeking to ensure an adequate supply of energy. The appointment of Counsel for the Public does not prevent any person from being heard or represented by counsel.

Based upon the foregoing, it is hereby

ORDERED, that that the duly designated Subcommittee of the Site Evaluation Committee shall hold a Pre-Hearing Conference, a Site Inspection Visit and a Public Information Hearing at the times and places as set forth above; and it is

FURTHER ORDERED, that the Applicant shall cause this Order and Notice to be published, on or before May 27, 2010, in a newspaper of general statewide circulation. The Applicant shall also cause this Order and Notice to be published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in Grafton County as soon as practicable, consistent with such newspaper's publication schedules. In addition, the Applicant shall publish at least one display advertisement publicizing the public information hearing in a newspaper of general circulation in Grafton County not less than ten, nor more than fourteen days, prior to the public information hearing. The Applicant shall file an affidavit attesting to said publications of notice with the Chairman of the Committee on or before June 20, 2010.

Whole Village hosts Eco-Learning Farmstead

PLYMOUTH — The Eco-Learning Farmstead (ELFS) is a community-driven, farm/garden initiative with the motto: Let's all grow together! The aim of this initiative is to promote healthy eating and active living by bringing consumers together with the land and their food. ELFS's mission is to provide multi-generational, experiential learning opportunities that embrace sustainability through community farming, teaching nutrition, food preparation/preservation, the value of physical activity and sustainable/eco-friendly choices. The ELFS's program provides mentoring for young and new gardeners. ELFS empowers youth to take on leadership roles at the Kids Eco-learning Farm Stand at the Plymouth Farmer's Market.

The Whole Village Resource Center will provide spaces for gardens, storage, workshops and kitchen. Eventually a greenhouse will be built to extend the growing season while teaching four-season gardening. The United Methodist Church is also supplying garden space. The Center for Active Living and Healthy Communities at Plymouth State University will provide professional support and interns. All townspeople, folks from the Plymouth Bridge House (local shelter), Head Start children and students from the public schools are invited to participate. Harvested food

will be donated to the Bridge House, Plymouth Area Community Closet Food Pantry, Head Start, and sold at local farm stands, with a share of profits and extra food given to food distribution centers.

Master Gardeners from the UNH Cooperative Extension Service are mentors for the 20-plus families involved with ELFS. One of the growing techniques that will be used is the "sistering approach" to sustainable gardening. This is a great gardening approach to teach children about companion planting. The sisters are inseparable and all work together in order for each sister to thrive. This trio: corn, beans and squash, have a symbiotic relationship that helps sustain the crops and gives them maximum nourishment. The corn stalk offers itself as a structure for the beans to climb on. While the beans supply the corn with needed nitrogen as well as well as improving the overall fertility of the soil. When the beans climb the corn stalk, it provides the stalk with added stability. The squash vines grow at the base of the bean and corn plants and provide a type of living mulch to help conserve water and provide weed control. The roots from the squash vines are shallow and will not invade the roots of the other plants. Once the plants have been harvested, they can be incorporated into the soil as organic compost, thus fertilizing the soil

even more. In this approach, the efficiency of space is not only beneficial, but it is also very easy to achieve results.

ELFS meets at the garden areas on Wednesdays. During the spring (June 2, 9, 16), they meet from 3-4:30 p.m. The remainder of the summer, they meet Wednesday

between 9 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. Volunteers are always needed to assist at the Farm Stand: set up 2-3 p.m.; 3-5 p.m. for one hour shifts, and take-down 6-6:30 p.m.

ELFS is looking for donations of used vases, plastic or paper bags, shovels, hoes,
