The Baker River Valley is a unique East-West corridor. It enjoys fabulous sun rises and sun sets and benefits from a special micro climate, being well protected by beautiful mountain ranges all along its course. It is also a great migratory route for numerous bird species.

The river, the valley and the mountains are a recreational source for countless visitors all year round. (the snowmobile trails are numerous, the river is a summer playground, the Rumney climbing Rocks are of international fame and so is Plymouth State University.) The beauty of the area is thus a source of revenue supporting the livelihood of many a local citizen.

It is doubtful that the addition of 24 industrial size, 400 foot, eternally rotating wind mills, perched high on 2,000 foot mountain ridges, towering over the valley, will constitute an extra attraction for people who are fleeing the razzle dazzle of citylife for a breath of fresh air and some time out in peaceful surroundings with mountain views and the river to enjoy.

This project might well be the death knell for the tourist business and the retirement business in this area, which, apart from the college business is pretty much the mainstay of this neck of the woods. Many a university professor might have to relocate to protect their good night sleep.

Short of changing our property into a bus stop eatery catering to wind turbine viewing day tourists, we see little opportunity for the future of our house in case this project materializes.



Please consider the negative impact of this project on this beautiful area which at present can boast to be the 7<sup>th</sup> best in the nation to reside. Please do not approve this project.
