Dear New Hampshire Site Evaluation Committee:

In regards to the upcoming vote on the installation of the Antrim Wind Project, I would like to share my perspective. I have lived in Antrim my entire life, and I have been a strong supporter of this project from day one because I believe that we all have the responsibility to invest in long-term clean renewable energy solutions.

There is a common saying: "We do not inherit the earth from our ancestors; we borrow it from our children." Like many twenty-somethings today, I often wonder what kind of world I am inheriting, and what kind of world the generations that come after me will inherit. Can we do enough to stabilize the effects of climate change? Are we currently *doing* enough to leave the world better than it was?
