**ASSENTED-TO MOTION OF COUNSEL FOR THE PUBLIC FOR LEAVE TO  
RETAIN HERITAGE LANDSCAPES LLC AND FOR AN ORDER DIRECTING  
EVERSOURCE ENERGY TO BEAR THE COSTS THEREOF**

NOW COMES Counsel for the Public, by his attorneys, the office of the Attorney General, and pursuant to RSA 162-H:10, V, hereby respectfully moves for leave to retain an expert consultant and for an order directing Public Service Company of New Hampshire d/b/a Eversource Energy (the "Applicant") to bear the costs and fees of the consultant and reimburse Counsel for the Public or pay the fees and costs directly to Heritage Landscapes, LLC ("Heritage" or the "Consultant"), in an amount up to \$32,149. In support hereof, Counsel for the Public respectfully represents as follows:

1. On April 12, 2016, Applicant submitted an Application for a Certificate of Site and Facility (the "Application") to the New Hampshire Site Evaluation Committee (the "Committee" or "SEC") to construct a 12.9 mile transmission line in the towns of Madbury, Durham, Newington and Portsmouth.
2. On April 21, 2016, the Attorney General appointed the undersigned to serve as Counsel for the Public in this case pursuant to RSA 162-H:9.
3. On April 29, 2016, the Chairman of the Committee appointed a Subcommittee (the "Subcommittee") to consider the Application. The Subcommittee accepted the Application on June 13, 2016.

4. Pursuant to RSA 162-H:9, I, Counsel for the Public “shall represent the public in seeking to protect the quality of the environment and in seeking to assure an adequate supply of energy.” Counsel for the Public’s broad role includes conducting studies and investigations necessary and appropriate to carry out the purposes of the statute. See Order on Pending Motions, *In re Request of SEA-3, Inc. for Exemption*, dated August 10, 2015, at 9. Those issues “go beyond protection of the environment and assuring an adequate supply of energy” and include any matters identified in RSA 162-H:1. *Id.*

5. Pursuant to RSA 162-H:10, V, Counsel for the Public may employ such consultants as are necessary to further his or her duties under RSA ch. 162-H, and the costs of such consultants “shall be borne by the applicant in such amount as may be approved by the committee.”

6. Counsel for the Public wishes to retain Heritage to provide expert analysis and opinion concerning the Project’s impacts to historic and cultural resources. The details of services that will be provided are set forth in the attached Exhibit A, along with the project budget and rates the Consultant will charge, and resumes of the Heritage staff. The total cost of the work is estimated to be \$32,149.

7. Upon careful consideration of the Application, Counsel for the Public has deemed that the retention of the Consultant’s services to analyze the Project’s impacts to historic and cultural resources is necessary to carry out the purpose of the siting statute and to evaluate if the Project will assure an adequate supply of energy without unreasonably and adversely affecting the quality of the environment, including historic and cultural resources.

8. The Applicant proposes to construct a new transmission line in an existing utility right-of-way (“ROW”), replacing primarily 30-40 foot wooden distribution poles with

60-105 foot metal towers along much of the 12.9 mile project route. In some areas tree clearing will be conducted within the existing ROW. The Project will cross through or near numerous cultural and historic resources, and the resulting change in character and increased visibility will have some effect on historic and cultural resources.

9. The Applicant has submitted an analysis of historic and cultural resources identifying potentially affected resources within the Project area. Pursuant to RSA 162-H, it is Counsel for the Public's responsibility to test the completeness of the analysis and conclusions of the Application in order to inform the Subcommittee whether the Project would create an unreasonable adverse effect on historic sites. Counsel for the Public requests leave to retain Heritage to assist in the identification of historic and cultural resources and to assess potential impacts of the Project on historic and cultural resources.

10. Pursuant to RSA 162-H:10, V, Counsel for the Public requests that the Subcommittee order and direct the Applicant to pay the consultant's fees and costs, up to a total amount of \$32,149, as presented on invoices from the consultant on a monthly basis, with payments made within 30 days of receipt of an invoice by Applicant.

11. Counsel for the Public has endeavored to fairly and accurately estimate the total budget for the proposed services, but must nevertheless reserve the right to request additional sums should the need arise.

12. The Applicant assents to the relief sought in this motion.

13. The following parties concur in this motion: The Town of Newington, the Town of Durham and UNH, the Conservation Law Foundation, Helen Frink, the Durham Point/Little Bay Abutters, and the DeCapos.

14. At the time of filing, Counsel for the Public had not heard from The Nature Conservancy, Fat Dog Shellfish Co., LLC, or Ms. McCosker with regard to a request for concurrence.

WHEREFORE, Counsel for the Public respectfully requests that the Subcommittee enter an order authorizing the retention of Heritage Landscapes, LLC as a consultant pursuant to RSA 162-H:10, V, and directing the Applicant to bear the costs, as incurred monthly, up to a total of \$32,149, and to grant such additional relief as may be just.



## Heritage Landscapes LLC Scope of Work

6 Oct 2016

### Introduction to Above-ground Historic Sites & Cultural Landscapes Review

Eversource Energy (Applicant), has submitted an application to the New Hampshire Site Evaluation Committee (SEC) for the New Hampshire Seacoast Reliability Project (SRP). The proposed transmission line corridor extends 12.9 miles to connect a substation in Madbury south through the towns of Durham and Newington to a substation in Portsmouth. The Applicant has documented historic sites and scenic resources within the project corridor and assessed the potential for impact. However limited sites have been selected and consideration of cultural landscapes is a minor component. The Counsel for the Public, New Hampshire Attorney General, seeks an expert review to evaluate the completeness of historic above ground resources capture and the Applicant's determination of project impact, with particular attention paid to thorough capture of all such resources. The tasks will also include review of amendments to the SEC application and one is anticipated for SRP selected undergrounding of the transmission line within the Newington Historic District. The junctions of above, underground and under water sections are of particular interest to this review.

This scope of work is focused on review of above-ground historic sites captured and assessment of impacts determined by the Applicant, and the identification of additional above ground historic resources, with an assessment of the potential Seacoast Reliability Project impacts on them. In carrying out these tasks, Heritage Landscapes will collaborate with Counsel for the Public and Scenic and Aesthetic consultant experts to perform the following tasks. Six tasks and related task deliverables are outlined below to address the historic above ground resources review objectives.

### Scope of Work Tasks

#### **A. Review Applicant SEC reports and mapping for above ground historic resources and cultural landscapes**

Heritage Landscapes will conduct a thorough study of the Applicant's historic resources report and project mapping, and a contextual review of the visual assessment and archaeology reports, to determine the overall capture of cultural landscapes within the SRP APE. The review will be focused on and organized according to the 4 towns/cities (towns) hosting the proposed project route. The review will be catalogued in a data organization spreadsheet that will track inclusion of cultural landscapes. Relevant text and images of these documents will be excerpted and identified by source and citation.

**Task A Deliverables:** Project spreadsheet listing relevant documents, categories of assessment, and key excerpts. Narrative on methodology and overview of findings.

#### **B. Define discovery goals relevant to Historic resources and cultural landscapes**

As Task A proceeds, employ findings to date to develop discovery questions targeted to clarify methods and data needed. Questions will be refined and additional questions developed through review of Pre-Filed Testimony, NH Department of Historic Resources Project Area Forms, comment provided to the SEC, correspondence or other documents topically relevant to historic resources and cultural landscapes.

**Task B Deliverables:** Draft and final discovery questions.

### **C. Conduct expert field review of Seacoast Reliability Project Corridor to identify Historic Resources and Cultural landscapes informed by Resource Mapping**

Following in-depth study of historic resources report and context documents, conduct field review of corridor using windshield survey to identify additional historic resources and assess potential impacts. To guide field review, create resource maps of identified historic sites and cultural landscapes for the four towns along the SRP corridor. Mapping will be based on publicly available data including National Register and NH Department of Historic Resources State-listed properties as well as properties determined eligible for listing.

**Task C Deliverables:** List, map and charts of historic resources and cultural landscapes along the proposed SRP project corridor, report assessing potentially impacted resources.

### **D. Coordinate with Scenic Expert as directed by Client Group**

To address enlarged capture and assessment of impact for historic sites and cultural landscapes, collaborate with scenic expert to identify gaps in scenic and historic resources capture. Continuing from Task A, the location of scenic Key Observation Points (KOPs) will be reviewed in relationship to identified historic resources. Review photosimulations of historic resources included in the Applicant's visual assessment to evaluate selection and framing of important views to and from historic sites and cultural landscapes. Identify resources inadequately represented by the Applicant's photo-simulations and possible KOPs for potential photo-simulations by the scenic expert.

**Deliverable Task D:** Memo on directions agreed for increased historic resources capture.

### **E. Prepare Report Addressing potential Seacoast Reliability impacts to Historic Resources and Cultural Landscapes**

Heritage Landscapes will prepare a report of findings from all the above tasks, including responses to Discovery Questions. The report will evaluate the applicant's methods for identifying and assessing potential impacts to historic resources and cultural landscapes, and summarize gaps and omissions in their findings. Additional identification of resources will be highlighted as well as considering the SRP potential impacts to the full capture of historic resources and cultural landscapes.

A draft report will be produced for review and comment by the Counsel for the Public. Refinements will be made to respond to comments.

**Task E Deliverables:** Draft and Final Report addressing SRP corridor historic resources and cultural landscapes.

### **F. Assist with Technical Sessions, Pre-field Testimony, Testimony**

Heritage Landscapes will prepare pre-filed testimony, assist in developing questions for the technical session with the Applicant's expert; will give testimony at a technical session and be present for an evidentiary hearing, as well as assisting in briefs as directed. If relevant we will prepare exhibits for testimony based on the report prepared in task E.

**Task F Deliverables:** Carry out of the above tasks, attend technical sessions, prepare for and give testimony at relevant hearings in accord with Task F.
