
Dear Ms. Monroe:

Bury Northern Pass

Our family has owned a home on Route 116 in Easton, New Hampshire since 1957 and as an abutter we receive information about the Northern Pass route. It was with some relief that after Northern Pass's initial plans were met with opposition they changed their stance and decided that they could afford after all to bury some of the power line through the White Mountain National Forest. If they can bury one-third of the length of the electric corridor, then they can easily bury the entire length with the profit they expect to make on this project. Why should two-thirds of New Hampshire residents and its tourists be left with a second scar of towers and overhead transmission lines? All one has to do is to drive to the intersection of Routes 112 and 302 for a horrible sight that will one day be matched by a power line that will march down two-thirds of central New Hampshire.
