NH shouldn't bear the physical scars forever for a project that simply will not benefit our citizens as much as it will benefit Eversource/Hydro-Quebec and residents/businesses outside our state.

Protect us: do the right thing and vote against this commercial land grab that if granted, will impact our citizens negatively forever.
